The events chronicled by Barry Allen were grouped by themes into a cohesive narrative. What follows is the definitive timeline of the DC Universe, its major events, and crucial players.



Wally West, Kid Flash I, becomes the third hero known as the Flash in Crisis on Infinite Earths (1985) #12.

Power Girl (Kara Zor-L) [All-Star Comics (1976) #58], the Supergirl of a destroyed parallel universe, goes through a long period of amnesia regarding her origins until she is much later reunited with her cousin Kal-L, the Superman of that universe, in Infinite Crisis (2005) #2.

Yolanda Montez takes up the mantle of her godfather, Ted Grant, as Wildcat II and joins Infinity, Inc. [Infinity Inc. (1984) #12, #25-26; Crisis on Infinite Earths (1985) #6]

Beth Chapel, medical prodigy and protégée of Dr. Charles McNider, adopts her mentor's superhero identity and becomes Dr. Mid-Nite in his honor as a member of Infinity, Inc. [Infinity Inc. (1984) #19-22, #25]



Rick Tyler, son of Rex Tyler (Hourman I), uses his father's Miraclo pills to become Hourman II and a member of Infinity, Inc. [Infinity Inc. (1984) #20-22, #25]



Orphan Billy Batson is granted the powers of the ancients by the wizard Shazam and becomes his champion, the Captain. [Justice League (2011) #7-11, #0, #14-16, #18-21]

A disgraced football player from the 25th century, Michael Jon Carter, comes to our present and takes the name Booster Gold. [Booster Gold (1987) #1, #8-9; Secret Origins (1986) #35]



Roy Harper (Speedy
I) discovers he has
fathered daughter Lian
Harper with the assassin
Cheshire. [The New Teen
Titans (1984) #21]

Former Marine Jack
Wheeler returns to
the Quad Cities and
becomes the gun-toting,

hockey-mask-wearing vigilante **Wild Dog** to battle domestic terror. [Wild Dog (1987) #1-4]

Darkseid fools the people of Earth into turning on the superhero community in Legends (1987) #1-6. This enables Amanda Waller to reactivate Task Force X, the modern-day Suicide Squad, comprising super-villains incarcerated at Belle Reve Prison under the watch of warden John Economos. [Suicide Squad (1987) #1]

Following a series of stealth missions, the darkness-manipulating **Nightshade (Eve Eden)** joins the new Suicide Squad. [Suicide Squad (1987) #1; Secret Origins (1986) #28]



The legendary metal-handed spy Sarge Steel [Sarge Steel (1964) #1] emerges as a presidential liaison to the metahuman community in Legends (1987) #3.

Peacemaker (Christopher Smith) becomes an increasingly unstable operative of the U.S. spy agencies. [Vigilante (1983) #36-38]

Reunited by businessman (and limited telepath) Maxwell Lord, the Justice League becomes the Justice

League International. Their roster includes Batman I, Martian Manhunter, Black Canary II, Blue Beetle II, Guy Gardner, Booster Gold, Captain Atom, the Captain, Doctor Fate I, Dr. Light II, Mister Miracle II, and Rocket Red. [Justice League (1987) #1-2; Justice League International (1987) #7]



U.S. military general Wade Eiling debuts in Captain Atom (1987) #1.

Formerly with the Star City PD, **Detective Maggie Ellen Sawyer** makes the **Metropolis Special Crimes Unit** a force to be reckoned with. [Superman (1987) #4, #15]



Green Arrow I (Oliver Queen) and Black Canary II (Dinah Drake Lance) move to Seattle and encounter the deadly assassin Shado. [Green Arrow: The Longbow Hunters (1987) #1]

The child of Swamp Thing and Abigail Arcane, **Tefé Holland**, sprouts in **Swamp Thing** (1982) #65 and is fully born in **Swamp Thing** (1982) #90.

Metropolis schoolteacher José
Delgado becomes the vigilante known as Gangbuster. [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #434]

Exhausting their life energies, a representative **Guardian of the Universe** and his Zamaron mate travel to Earth to select
a group of humans as the universe's new Guardians, most
prominently the mystical hero **Extrãno**. [Millennium (1988)
#1-8]

G'nort (G'nort Esplanade Gneesmacher), an unwitting alien dupe in a false **Green Lantern Corps**, first appears in **Justice League International (1987)** #10.



Superman I encounters the spy organization Checkmate for the first time. [Action Comics (1938) #598]

The Joker enacts his most violent and vulgar plan yet, shooting and paralyzing Barbara Clifford Zmeck, a soldier experimented on by the U.S. government the same way
Captain Atom had been, snaps and becomes the villain Major
Force. [Captain Atom (1987) #12; Captain Atom Annual #1]

Arnold Wesker, the criminal known as the Ventriloquist, and his puppet, Scarface, begin terrorizing Gotham City.

[Detective Comics (1937) #583-584; Showcase '94 #8-9]



Gordon (Batgirl I). [Batman: The Killing Joke (1988)]

Matrix, a protoplasmic, shape-shifting life-form from another dimension, poses as the late Supergirl. [Superman (1987) #16, #19-22; Action Comics (1938) #677]



Darkseid and Highfather form an alliance to stop an Anti-Life entity, assembling Superman I, Batman I, Starfire, Martian Manhunter, Orion, Doctor Fate II, Lightray, Forager, Etrigan the Demon, and Green Lantern III (John Stewart). [Cosmic Odyssey (1988) #1-4]

Ice-wielding Norwegian heroine Tora Olafsdotter succeeds
Sigrid Nansen as Ice/Icemaiden II and joins the JLI. [Justice
League International (1987) #14; Secret Origins (1986) #33;
Justice League America (1989) #102]

Brazilian pyrokinetic Fire (Beatriz "Bea" Bonilla da Costa) joins the JLI. [Justice League International (1987) #14; Secret Origins (1986) #33]

Starman IV (Prince Gavyn) is reincarnated in the body of Earthman Will Payton. [Starman (1988) #1; Starman (1994) #59]



Animal Man comes out of retirement as a superhero, balancing that with his marriage to his wife, Ellen, parenting his children, Cliff and Maxine, and discovering the cosmic forces that dictate his life. [Animal Man (1988) #1]

Dawn Marie Granger becomes the second Dove, replacing the late Don Hall and partnering with his brother, Hank (Hawk I). [Hawk & Dove (1988) #1-5]



Jason Todd (Robin II) is kidnapped and violently beaten and killed by the Joker. [Batman (1939) #427-428]. Soon afterward, Jason's body is recovered and slowly brought back to full strength by Talia al Ghul using a Lazarus Pit. [Red Hood: The Lost Days (2010) #1]



An alien alliance made up of the Khunds, Dominators, Thanagarians, Gil'Dishpan, Durlans, Psions, Citadelians, and Warlords of Okaara (with observers from Daxam) invades Earth. [Invasion! (1988) #1-3]

Following her paralysis at the hands of the Joker, **Barbara Gordon** becomes **Oracle I**, hacker and digital information specialist. [Suicide Squad (1987) #23; The Batman Chronicles (1995) #5]

Vril Dox II forms the L.E.G.I.O.N. (Licensed Extra-Governmental Interstellar Operatives Network). [Invasion! (1988) #1; L.E.G.I.O.N. '89 #1-11]



The second Black Orchid (Flora Black) debuts. [Black Orchid (1988) #1-3]

The Doom Patrol re-forms once more under the watch of Dr. Niles Caulder, with original member Robotman II (Cliff Steele), Dorothy Spinner, Crazy Jane (Kay Challis), and Rebis, an amalgam of Negative Man and Dr. Eleanor Poole. [Doom Patrol (1988) #19] Later, they are befriended by Danny the Street and Flex Mentallo. [Doom Patrol (1988) #35]

Helena Rosa Janice Bertinelli, heiress of the executed
Bertinelli crime family, becomes the vigilante Huntress II. [The
Huntress (1989) #1]

Evan McCulloch, a Scottish thief and assassin, becomes Mirror Master II. [Animal Man (1988) #8]

Dos Rios, Texas, city councilman **Rafael Sandoval** becomes the



motorcycle-riding vigilante **El Diablo II**. [*El Diablo* (1989) #1; Secret Origins (1986) #45]

French twins Constance and Vivian D'Aramis both operate with Justice League Europe, sharing the name Crimson Fox. [Justice League Europe (1989) #6]

Wally West meets Linda Kiyo Park, a Keystone City TV journalist. [The Flash (1987) #28]

Gotham City teenager Timothy Jackson Drake becomes the third Robin. [Batman (1939) #440-442; The New Titans (1984) #60-61]



Maxima, the super-powered queen of the planet **Almerac**, first appears in **Action Comics** (1938) #645.

Lonnie Machin becomes the first Gotham City-based ideological vigilante to use the name Anarky. [Detective Comics (1937) #608-609]



The Time Masters, a team of time travelers led by Rip Hunter, debut in *Time Masters* (1990) #1.





A space shuttle mission ends tragically for Hank Henshaw [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #465-466], leading to his later rebirth as the Cyborg Superman. [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #500].

Aleea Strange, daughter of Adam Strange and Alanna, is born on the planet Rann. [Adam Strange (1990) #3]

Hector and Lyta Hall's son, **Daniel Hall**, the child who would inherit the Dreaming and the responsibilities of **Morpheus**, is born. [*The Sandman* (1989) #22]

The Linear Men, a group of time travelers headquartered at the Vanishing Point, become prominent in the present day. [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #476-478; Superman (1986) #59]

Disgruntled CIA agent **Benjamin Lockwood** becomes **Agent Liberty**. [Superman (1987) #60; Agent Liberty Special
[1992] #1]

Matthew Ryder, the time traveler better known as Waverider, comes to our present to stop the rise of the despot known

to him only as Monarch—in reality, Hank Hall (Hawk I).
[Armageddon 2001 (1991) #1-2]



Gotham City police detective **Renee Montoya** makes her debut. [**Batman (1939) #475**]

Ryan Kendall becomes the second character to hold the mantle of Black Condor. [Black Condor (1992) #1]



Ray Terrill becomes the Ray II. [The Ray (1992) #1; Justice League of America: The Ray - Rebirth (2017) #1]

Victor Zsasz, the infamous Gotham City serial killer, begins his reign of terror. [Batman: Shadow of the Bat (1992) #1; The Batman Chronicles (1995) #3]

The daughter of the Batman villain **Cluemaster**,

Stephanie Brown, becomes the Gotham City crime-fighter **Spoiler**. [Detective Comics (1937) #647-649]

Jean-Paul Valley is brought into the legacy of the Order of St. Dumas and succeeds his slain father in the role of Azrael.

[Batman: Sword of Azrael (1992) #1]

Rose Xia Wilson, daughter of Deathstroke, begins a path that leads through both villainy and heroism. [Deathstroke, the Terminator (1991) #15]

Delta City native and diner cook **Stu Mosely** becomes the quick-witted vigilante known as the **Heckler**. [*The Heckler* (1992) #1]

Alien peacekeeper **Ferrin Colos** is assigned to protect Earth on behalf of the **Darkstars**, rivals of the Green Lantern Corps. [Darkstars (1992) #1-3]

Jesse Quick (Jesse Chambers), later Liberty Belle II, debuts. [Justice Society of America (1992) #1, #8-9]

In the South American country of Santa Prisca, **Bane**—a man born in one of the world's most dangerous prisons—has a vision of destroying **Batman I**, compelling him to travel to Gotham City. [Batman: Vengeance of Bane (1993) #1]

Speedy I adopts the new identity of Arsenal. [The New Titans (1984) #99]

Superman I dies stopping the alien Doomsday. [Superman (1986) #75] In his absence, Steel III, Superboy II (Kon-EI), Eradicator, and Cyborg Superman attempt to claim his mantle. [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #500]



Superman I returns from the dead [Superman: The Man of Steel (1991) #25], teaming up with Steel III, Superboy II, Green Lantern II (Hal Jordan), Matrix, and Lex Luthor to bring down Cyborg Superman and Mongul. [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #504; Action Comics (1938) #691; Superman: The Man of Steel (1991) #26; Superman (1987) #82]

Bane defeats Batman I in battle, breaking his back. [Batman (1940) #497] Azrael takes his place as a more violent Dark Knight [Batman (1940) #498] for a time before Bruce Wayne reclaims the cowl. [Batman: Legends of the Dark Knight (1989) #63]



A race of alien parasites comes to Earth to feed off of the spinal fluid of humans, but their feeding leads to dozens of humans becoming metahumans [Lobo Annual (1993) #1]—most prominently
Tommy Monaghan,

the infamous Hitman. [The Demon Annual (1993) #2]

Hal Jordan becomes possessed by **Parallax** and slays the Guardians and the Green Lantern Corps. [*Green Lantern* (1990) #48-50]



Cartoonist and unlikely hero **Kyle Rayner** [*Green Lantern* (1990) #48] is bestowed one of the last Green Lantern rings by **Ganthet** and becomes the fifth **Green Lantern** of Earth—and for a time, the only Green Lantern in the universe. [*Green Lantern* (1990) #49-50]





Natasha Jasmine Irons, niece of John Henry Irons (Steel III) and an eventual superhero in her own right (Steel IV), debuts. [Steel (1994) #1]

Bart Allen arrives from the future and becomes the hyperactive Impulse I. [The Flash (1987) #92-94]



William Everett III, grandson of the original Amazing-Man, debuts as Amazing-Man II. [Justice League America (1987) #86; Justice League Task Force (1993) #13]





Grant Albert Emerson takes the superhero identity Damage. [Damage (1994) #1] He is later a member of the Titans [The New Titans (1984) #0], the Freedom Fighters [JSA (1999) #49], and the Justice Society of America [Justice Society of America (2007) #1].



Parallax (Hal Jordan) and Extant attempt to rewrite the timeline. The Justice Society suffers the greatest losses in battle, including the deaths of Atom I and Dr. Mid-Nite I.

Hourman I is also believed dead but is actually impersonated by a time-traveling successor. [Zero Hour: Crisis in Time (1994) #4-0; JSA (1999) #66]

After **Ted Knight** is re-aged during **Zero Hour**, his eldest son, **David**, takes up the identity of **Starman** [**Zero Hour: Crisis in Time** (1994) #1], only to be killed his first night out. [**Starman** (1994) #0] His younger brother, **Jack**, becomes the seventh **Starman** to avenge his brother's death and to protect Opal City. [**Starman** (1994) #1]

King Shark (Nanaue), a humanoid shark from an underwater society, makes his initial appearance in Superboy (1994) #0.

Green Arrow I dies stopping a deadly terrorist attack. His longlost son, Connor Hawke [Green Arrow (1988) #0], becomes the second Green Arrow, continuing his father's legacy. [Green Arrow (1988) #101]



Queen Hippolyta, disappointed in her daughter Diana's progress as a global agent of peace, commands Wonder Woman II to return to Themyscira to prove herself once more. [Wonder Woman (1988) #90] Diana temporarily loses the costume and identity to Artemis, an Amazon from the Bana-Mighdall

tribe whom Hippolyta had recently invited back to the island.

[Wonder Woman (1988) #93]

Mongul II, the son of the original Mongul, and Mongal, Mongul I's daughter, begin their long campaigns of interstellar havoc. [Showcase '95 (1995) #8]



Neron, Lord of the Underworld, makes bargains with numerous super-villains that increase their powers. Simultaneously, he turns Blue Devil (Daniel Cassidy) into an actual demon. [Underworld Unleashed (1995) #1-3]

Savitar, self-proclaimed god of speed, tries to steal the powers of the Flash Family in a battle that claims the life of Johnny Quick I. [The Flash (1987) #108; Impulse (1995) #11]

Black Canary II and Oracle I begin operating covertly as the Birds of Prey. [Black Canary/Oracle: Birds of Prey (1995) #1] They are later joined by Huntress II. [Birds of Prey (1998) #57]

Daughter of Lennox (a son of Zeus) and Gateway City Museum of Antiquity's Professor Helena Sandsmark, teenager Cassie Sandsmark [Wonder Woman (1988) #105] becomes the second Wonder Girl. [Wonder Woman (1998) #111]







Grayven, the third son of **Darkseid**, younger brother of **Orion** and **Kalibak**, debuts. [*Green Lantern* (1990) #71, #74-75]

After leaving the **Titans**, **Nightwing** relocates to the dangerous city of **Blüdhaven** as a solo hero in **Nightwing** (1996) #1.

Aztek the Ultimate Man, a man known as Uno who was raised by the secret group known as the Q Society to defeat the evil god Mageddon, debuts in the city of Vanity. [Aztek: The Ultimate Man (1996) #1] He later dies fighting Mageddon alongside the JLA in JLA (1997) #41.





Earth's sun. In a dying act of heroism, Hal Jordan uses his remaining Parallax powers to reignite the star. [The Final Night (1996) #0-4] Clark Kent (Superman

An alien known as the

Sun-Eater extinguishes



I) marries Lois Lane.
[Superman: The Wedding
Album (1996) #1]

Garth (Aqualad I), embracing his mystical heritage, becomes the undersea mage known as Tempest. [Tempest (1996) #1-4] The **Justice League of America** reunites to defeat the **Hyperclan**, a superhero team from space who are revealed to be **White Martians**. [JLA (1997) #1-4]

A flawed, evil clone of Superboy II (Kon-EI) known as Match appears. [Superboy (1994) #35-36]

Superman develops volatile electromagnetic powers [The Adventures of Superman (1987) #545; Superman (1986) #123], then splits into two beings: Superman-Red and Superman-Blue. Inadvertently, their powers give rise to the Millennium Giants, who must be defeated before Superman can return to normal. [Superman: The Man of Steel (1991) #79; Superman (1987) #135; Superman Forever (1998) #1]

Tomorrow Woman, a super-powered android created by T.O. Morrow and Professor Ivo to infiltrate and destroy the JLA, turns against her creators and perishes. [JLA (1997) #5]

The angel **Zauriel** helps the JLA defeat the rogue **Asmodel**, then leaves Heaven to join the team. [JLA (1997) #6-7]





Michael Holt, the world's thirdsmartest man, a great inventor, and an Olympic athlete, becomes Mr. Terrific II after losing his wife, Paula, and unborn son, Jeffrey. [The Spectre (1992) #54; Mr. Terrific: Year One (2025) #1-2]

Cissie King-Jones, an elite teenage archer and daughter of Bonnie King-Jones, once known as Miss Arrowette [World's

Finest Comics (1941) #113], is encouraged by her mother to become Arrowette. [Impulse (1997) #28]





Matthew Tyler (Hourman III), a time-manipulating android from the 853rd century based on the DNA of Hourman I, appears. [JLA (1997) #12]

Cameron Chase, noted agent of the Department of Extranormal Operations (DEO), makes her debut in Batman (1939) #550.

Prometheus, a villain whose armor makes him a formidable foe to the JLA, debuts. [New Year's Evil: Prometheus #1 (1998); JLA (1997) #16-17]



Keystone City teenager **Jakeem Johnny Williams**, a.k.a. **Jakeem Thunder**, becomes the newest partner to the mystical **Thunderbolt genie**. [*The Flash* (1987) #134; *JLA* (1997) #28-31]

The Joker murders Commissioner Gordon's wife, Sarah Essen.

The **Black Flash**, the grim reaper for speedsters, first encounters the Flash. [The Flash (1987) #138-141]

Greta Hayes, a young woman killed by her adoptive brother, survives as the ghostly member of Young Justice known as the Secret. [Young Justice: The Secret (1998) #1; Young Justice (1998) #42]

After defeating a villain named **Bedlam** who had removed all the adults from Earth [JLA: World Without Grown-Ups (1998) #1-2], Robin III, Impulse I, Superboy II, Wonder Girl II, Arrowette II, and Secret [Young Justice (1998) #1-4] form the teenage superhero team known as Young Justice. They are supervised by Justice League veteran Red Tornado II. [Young Justice (1998) #1]



The heroes discover **Hypertime**, a realm from which all realities past and present can be accessed. [The Kingdom (1999) #2]

After Victor Stone (Cyborg) temporarily goes rogue and forces a conflict between the JLA and every living Titan [JLA/Titans (1998) #1-3], the original five Titans—Nightwing, Donna Troy, Arsenal, the Flash III, and Tempest—reestablish the team with additional members Cyborg, Argent, Damage I, Jesse Quick, and Starfire. [Titans Secret Files (1999) #1]



Justice Legion Alpha, the Justice League of the 853rd century, comes to our present to help the JLA stop Vandal Savage and a future antagonist of Superman's known as Solaris. [JLA (1997) #23; JLA (1998) #1,000,000; DC One Million (1998) #1-4]



Lagoon Boy (La'gaan), a monstrous-looking Atlantean outsider, begins serving as Aquaman II's partner. [Aquaman (1994) #50]

Courtney Whitmore, stepdaughter of Pat Dugan (Stripesy), uses the late Skyman's cosmic converter belt to become the second Star-Spangled Kid. [DCU Heroes Secret Files



(1998) #1; Stars and S.T.R.I.P.E. (1999) #0-1] Dugan assists her using the armor code-named S.T.R.I.P.E. Eventually, Whitmore inherits Starman VII's cosmic staff and the Starman legacy [Starman (1994) #80], calling herself Stargirl. [JSA All-Stars (2003) #3]

Dr. Pieter Anton Cross, a man of Norwegian origin who was delivered by the original **Dr. Mid-Nite** as a baby, becomes the third Dr. Mid-Nite, hero of Portsmouth City. [**Doctor Mid-Nite** (1999) #1-3]

The granddaughter of Speed Saunders, Kendra Saunders—a reincarnation of Shiera Hall who initially has no access to her past memories—becomes Hawkgirl II. [JSA Secret Files and Origins (1999) #1]

After the murder of the first Sandman, Wesley Dodds, the Justice Society of America reunites as the JSA—a combination of veteran members Sentinel (Alan Scott, the first Green Lantern), Jay Garrick (Flash I), and Ted Grant (Wildcat I); their original peers' descendants Black Canary II, Starman VII, Hourman III, Atom Smasher, Hawkgirl II, and Doctor Fate III (Hector Hall, formerly Silver Scarab); and Sandman's former teenage sidekick, Sand (Sanderson "Sandy" Hawkins). [JSA Secret Files and Origins [1999] #1; JSA (1999) #1-4]



Cassandra Cain, the daughter of assassins Lady Shiva and David Cain, is trained by Batman I and Oracle I to become Batgirl II. [Batman (1940) #567; Detective Comics [1937] #734; Batman: Legends of the Dark Knight [1989] #120]



Inertia, a.k.a. Thaddeus Thawne, an evil speedster clone created based on Impulse I's DNA, becomes one of his and the Flash Family's archenemies. [Impulse (1995) #50-53]

Dr. Harleen Frances Quinzel, a psychiatrist who works at Arkham Asylum, becomes the Joker's partner in crime and romance, **Harley Quinn.** [Batman:

Harley Quinn (1999) #1]

After the death of Jim Corrigan, the **Spectre** finds a new host in Hal Jordan. [Day of Judgment (1999) #1-5]



Empress (Anita Fite), a prominent member of Young Justice, debuts. [Young Justice (1998) #16, #19]

Crispus Allen, GCPD detective and partner to Renee Montoya, arrives in Gotham. [Detective Comics (1937) #742]


The story of **Ra's al Ghul's** use of Batman's anti-JLA protocols is told in **JLA** (1997) #43-46.

Lex Luthor shocks the world by becoming president of the United States. [Superman: Lex 2000 (2000) #1]



Orca (Grace Balin), a whale-human hybrid, becomes a nemesis to the Bat-Family. [Batman (1940) #579-581]

Wally West (Flash III) marries Linda Park. [The Flash (1987) #159]





Manchester Black, British antihero and leader of the proactive and deadly "superhero" team the Elite, challenges Superman for the first time. [Action Comics (1939) #775]



Following a long period in a supernatural dimension, Carter Hall (Hawkman) is reborn on the planet Thanagar and rejoins the Justice Society. [JSA (1999) #23-25]



Brought back from the dead by Hal Jordan as one of his last acts as **Parallax**, **Oliver Queen** resumes his **Green Arrow** career alongside his son, Connor. [**Green Arrow** (2001) #1-10]



The JSA learns of **Victoria Sinclair**, a high-stakes bookmaker who runs metahuman fights and other illicit gambling activities under the code name **Roulette**. [JSA Secret Files and Origins (1999) #2]

After an accident involving the Cosmic Treadmill, Keystone City criminal profiler **Hunter Zolomon**

Oliver Queen takes in teenage runaway Mia
Dearden [Green Arrow
(2001) #2], who—over
Queen's objections—
eventually becomes
Speedy II. [Green Arrow
(2001) #45]



[The Flash Secret Files & Origins (1999) #3] is turned into the time-manipulating speedster **Zoom**, one of the Flash III's greatest enemies. [The Flash (1987) #196-200]



Slobo, a.k.a. Li'l Lobo, a teenage clone of the Main Man, becomes a reluctant member of Young Justice. [Young Justice (1998) #38]

Trickster II (juvenile delinquent **Axel Walker**) battles the Flash III for the

first time. [The Flash (1987) #183]

Batman I's initial battle with **Hush** is told in **Batman (1940)** #609-619.



A robot known as Indigo, later revealed as Brainiac 8, reactivates a dangerous Superman robot that fights the Titans and Young Justice. [Titans/Young Justice: Graduation Day (2003) #1] Omen (Lilith Clay) and Donna Troy die during the conflict, a tragedy that leads both teams to disband. [Titans/Young Justice: Graduation Day (2003) #1-3; Teen Titans (2003) #24]



Arsenal (Roy Harper)'s band of Outsiders debuts in Outsiders (2003) #1.



Anissa Pierce, a.k.a. Thunder, density-shifting daughter of Black Lightning, joins the Outsiders. [Outsiders (2003) #1]

Grace Choi, a super-strong powerhouse and Thunder's romantic partner, joins the Outsiders. [Outsiders (2003) #1] She later discovers she is a half-Amazon of the Bana-Mighdall tribe. [Amazons Attack (2007) #5]



The Teen Titans regroup in Teen Titans (2003) #1.



Superboy II learns that his cloned body was created using Lex Luthor's DNA as well as Superman I's. [Teen Titans (2003) #1]

Impulse I becomes Kid Flash II. [Teen Titans (2003) #4]

The Superman-Batman team exposes President Luthor's crimes, leading to his swift impeachment and removal from office. [Superman/Batman (2003) #1-6]



The original **Supergirl** returns to life. [Superman/Batman (2003) #8]

Lorena Marquez, the protector of Sub Diego and sidekick to Aquaman II (Arthur Curry), becomes Aquagirl II. [Aquaman (2003) #16-20]



Tim Drake's father, **Jack**, discovers his son is Robin III and forces him to temporarily retire. [Robin (1993) #125]



Batman I awards **Spoiler** the Robin identity [*Robin* (1993) #126] only to discover her general unreadiness and dismiss her from duty. [*Robin* (1993) #128]

Atom II's ex-wife, Jean Loring, murders Sue Dibny. [Identity Crisis (2004) #1] And causes

the murders of Captain Boomerang I and Robin III's father Jack Drake. [Identity Crisis (2004) #5]



Jason Rusch becomes the second Firestorm [Firestorm (2004) #1] after Ronnie Raymond is killed by Shadow Thief. [Identity Crisis (2004) #5]

Captain Boomerang II (Owen Mercer), son of the original Captain Boomerang and speedster Meloni Thawne, debuts. [Identity Crisis (2004) #3-7; The Flash [1987] #224-225]

Manhunter VI (Kate Spencer), an L.A.-based attorney unaffiliated with the Manhunter cult, hits the streets in Manhunter (2004) #1.

The Spectre, Parallax, and Hal Jordan separate for good. The Spectre guides Jordan's soul back to his body, where he is reborn as Green Lantern II once again [Green Lantern: Rebirth (2004) #4], leading his fellow Lanterns in final battle with Parallax in order to rebuild the Green Lantern Corps. [Green Lantern: Rebirth (2004) #6]





Blue Beetle II (Ted Kord) begins investigating several conspiracies quickly coming into focus: Checkmate having access to every major superhero's identity, Earth's super-villains beginning to assemble under a new Secret Society, a severe disruption in magic, and an erupting interplanetary war between Rann and Thanagar. Kord's path leads to Checkmate Mountain, where he is assassinated by his former

friend Maxwell Lord. Lord had taken control of the spy organization and begins deploying robots called O.M.A.C.s to kill superheroes. [Countdown to Infinite Crisis (2005) #1]



Black Alice (Lori Zechlin), a teenage member of the Birds of Prey who can take on the abilities and powers of other magic users, debuts in *Birds* of *Prey* (2005) #76.

The resurrected **Jason Todd**, adopting one of the Joker's early guises, returns to Gotham as the **Red Hood**. [**Batman (1940)** #635]

S.H.A.D.E., the Super-Human Advanced Defense Executive, an organization that employs (among others) Frankenstein and the Freedom Fighters, is first mentioned in Seven Soldiers: Frankenstein (2006) #3.



The Bride (Lady Frankenstein), monster hunter and spy, debuts in Seven Soldiers: Frankenstein (2006) #3.

The Seven Soldiers of Victory III—Bulleteer, Frankenstein, Klarion, the Manhattan Guardian, Mister Miracle III (Shilo Norman), Shining Knight (Sir Ystin), and Zatanna—repel the alien threat of the Sheeda without actually meeting one

another face-to-face. [Seven Soldiers of Victory (2005) #1]

Holly Granger, the estranged and aggressive sister of Dawn Granger, becomes Hawk II to Dawn's Dove II. [Teen Titans (2003) #22]

Donna Troy is resurrected by the Titans of Myth. [DC Special: The Return of Donna Troy (2005) #1-4]

The **Shadowpact**, a group of occult superheroes including **Blue Devil**, **Detective Chimp**, **Enchantress**, **Nightshade**, **Ragman**, and **Zauriel**, assemble as a team. [Day of Vengeance (2005) #1-6]

Peter Merkel Jr. becomes the third Ragdoll, following his father and a criminal named Colby Zag. [Villains United (2005) #1-6]

Scandal Savage, a skilled mercenary and fighter and daughter of the immortal villain Vandal Savage, debuts. [Villains United (2005) #1-6]

The Secret Six III, a group of villains assembled by the mysterious Mockingbird to work against the re-formed Secret Society of Super-Villains, brings together Catman, Deadshot, Scandal Savage, Ragdoll III, Cheshire, and a parademon.

[Villains United (2005) #1-6]



Jai West and Iris West II, twin children of Wally West and Linda Park, are born. [The Flash (1987) #225]

Reluctantly, Wonder Woman II is forced to kill Maxwell Lord on live television to protect the world. [Wonder Woman (1988) #219]

The heroes learn there are survivors of the first Great Crisis—Superman and Lois Lane of the original Earth-2, Alexander Luthor Jr., and Superboy of Earth-Prime—and that Luthor and Superboy-Prime had been behind the conspiracies identified by Ted Kord. [Infinite Crisis (2005) #1] Earth's defenders thwart their scheme to revive a flawed Multiverse, but there are casualties: Superboy II dies at the hands of Superboy-Prime [Infinite Crisis (2005) #6], Blüdhaven is destroyed [Infinite Crisis (2005) #4], the Flash III (Wally West) and his family disappear into the Speed Force [Infinite Crisis (2005) #4], and Kid Flash II ages to adulthood, becoming Flash IV. [Infinite Crisis (2005) #5, #7]

Gotham City police detective **Crispus Allen** becomes the newest human host for the **Spectre**. [Infinite Crisis (2005) #4]



Jaime Reyes debuts as Blue Beetle III. [Infinite Crisis (2005) #3, #5]

In the year following the Infinite Crisis, Superman I, Batman I. and Wonder Woman II each withdraw from the world to gain a new perspective on heroism. During those months. Elongated Man dies and is reunited with his wife, Sue, in the afterlife [52 (2006) #42, #52]; Renee Montoya is passed the identity of the Question by the dying Vic Sage [52 (2006) #1, #38,

#48]; Steel III and IV fight Lex Luthor and his Everyman program [52 (2006) #8, #14, #21, #39-40]; Adam Strange, Animal Man, and Starfire travel through space following the aftermath of the Rann/Thanagar war [52 (2006) #9, #17, #20, #43]; Black Adam creates a new family to rule the nation of Kahndaq peacefully, until that peace is torn asunder by World War III [52 (2006) #12, #16, #23, #44-45, #50; 52: World War III]; and Booster Gold discovers that a limited Multiverse has returned in the form of 52 parallel universes [52 (2006) #1-2, #7, #10, #15, #19, #37, #52].

During Clark Kent's yearlong sabbatical, in which he is without his powers, he and Lois Lane have a child, **Jonathan Samuel** "Jon" Kent. [Convergence: Superman (2015) #2]





The Great Ten, heroes representing the Chinese government, debut in **52** (2006) #6.

Batwoman II, Katherine Rebecca "Kate" Kane, debuts in Gotham. [52 (2006) #7, #9]

Checkmate is reorganized as a U.N.-supervised group overseeing metahuman activities. [52 (2006) #24]

Superman I [Superman (1939) #652], Batman I [Detective Comics (1937) #817], and Wonder Woman II [Wonder Woman (2006) #4] return to action.

Livewire (Leslie Willis), an electric-powered villain, makes her first of many attacks on Metropolis. [Action Comics (1938) #835]

Zachary Zatara, magic user and cousin of Zatanna Zatara, debuts in **Teen Titans** (2003) #34.

The **Sinestro Corps** of yellow-ring-wielding fearmongers is introduced. [**Green Lantern (2005) #10**]

Miss Martian (M'gann M'orzz), a White Martian who claims to be the niece of Martian Manhunter, joins the Teen Titans. [Teen Titans (2003) #37]

Ryan Choi becomes the Atom III. [DCU: Brave New World (2006) #1]





Damian Wayne, the artificially aged son of Batman I and Talia al Ghul, meets the Dark Knight for the first time. [Batman (1940) #655-658] In short order, he officially becomes Robin V. [Batman: Battle for the Cowl (2009) #3]

General Dru-Zod, Non, and Ursa—three members of the

Kryptonian military who were banished to the Phantom Zone for crimes against Krypton—escape and meet Superman for the first time. [Action Comics (1938) #844-846, #851; Action Comics Annual #11]



The newest iteration of the Justice League assembles

Superman I, Batman I, Wonder Woman II, Green Lantern

II, Black Canary II, Vixen, Black Lightning, Red Tornado II,

Geo-Force, Hawkgirl II (Kendra Saunders), and Arsenal, who
adopts the new name Red Arrow. [Justice League of America
(2006) #0-7]



The Justice Society of America reunites, with its largest lineup ever. [Justice Society of America (2007) #1-4] Among the new members are Tomcat/Wildcat III (Tommy Bronson), the son of Wildcat I; Maxine Hunkel, a.k.a. Cyclone, granddaughter of Red Tornado I; and Citizen Steel (Nathaniel Heywood), grandson of the original Steel.







The Reach, the alien creators of Blue Beetle's scarab and mortal enemies of the Green Lantern Corps, debut in *Blue Beetle* (2006) #12.

Flash IV (Bart Allen) is killed by Inertia and the Rogues. [The Flash: The Fastest Man Alive (2006) #13]

The JLA and JSA team up and, with the help of stranded members of a future team called the Legion of Super-Heroes, help

Flash III and his family return from the Speed Force. [Justice League of America (2006) #8-10]

The **Star Sapphire Corps**, wielders of the violet/love portion of the emotional spectrum, make themselves known. [*Green Lantern* (2005) #20]

The **Sinestro Corps** wages war upon the Green Lantern Corps. [Green Lantern: Sinestro Corps War Special (2007) #1; Green Lantern (2005) #21-26; Green Lantern Corps (2006) #14-18]

In the aftermath of the Sinestro Corps War, additional new Lantern Corps and members are revealed: the Alpha Lanterns, the Red Lanterns of rage, the Blue Lanterns of hope, the Orange Lanterns of avarice, the Indigo Tribe of compassion, and the Black Lanterns of death. [Green Lantern (2005) #25-28]



With the blessing of her father, Black Lightning, Jennifer Pierce joins the JSA as Lightning, as does Will Everett's grandson, Markus Clay, a.k.a. Amazing-Man III. [Justice Society of America (2007) #12]

The **Black Glove**, a sinister syndicate led by **Dr. Simon Hurt**, nearly destroys Batman's mind and spirit. In retaliation, Batman's psyche is temporarily possessed by his "backup identity," the terrifying **Zur-En-Arrh**. [**Batman (1940)** #676-681]

The mysterious villain known as **Libra** gathers Earth's supervillains and helps them enforce Darkseid's cosmic Anti-Life fascism alongside his Justifiers, an operation that comes to be known as the **Final Crisis**. Though victory is eventually achieved with the return to life of **the Flash II**, defeating Darkseid comes at a price: His omega beams seemingly kill Batman I—actually displacing him throughout several periods in time. [*Final Crisis* (2008) #0-7]

Super Young Team debuts in Final Crisis (2008) #2.

Mandrakk the Dark Monitor debuts in Final Crisis: Superman Beyond (2008) #1.



Kid Flash II and Superboy II return to life. [Final Crisis: Legion of Three Worlds (2008) #3-4]
